St. Xavier's Mahuadanr Hosts National Seminar on Harmonizing AI with Value-Based Education



St. Xavier's College, Mahuadanr, convened a National Seminar on December 11, 2025, exploring the intersection of AI and value-based higher education. Addressing 265 attendees, keynote speakers Dr. Fr. Dominic Savio SJ, Principal, St. Xavier's College (Autonomous), Kolkata and Secretary, JHEASA, accompanied by Fr. Jeyaraj Veluswamy SJ, Rector, St. Xavier's College (Autonomous), Kolkata emphasized that AI must serve as a supplementary tool rather than a substitute for holistic instruction. Fr. Jeyaraj Veluswamy SJ elaborated on the Jesuit approach to harmonizing technology with ethical responsibility and service to society. The forum successfully reinforced the necessity of balancing technological advancement with the Jesuit ethos of *cura personalis* and ethical stewardship.

Overall, the seminar significantly enhanced awareness of AI's role in higher education, reaffirmed the primacy of values in academic practice, addressed key challenges such as equity, data privacy, and curriculum relevance, and strengthened collaboration within the Jesuit Higher Education network.



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JHEASA Conference - South Zone



Workshop on Compassion • Truth • Peace • Dialogical Democracy Initiative (DDI)

12–14 December 2025 | Loyola College of Social Sciences (Autonomous), Thiruvananthapuram

The three-day South Zone JHEASA Workshop on Dialogical Democracy, Citizenship, and Eco-socially Engaged Spirituality was designed as a reflective and action-oriented learning process deeply rooted in Jesuit educational values. Bringing together faculty members and students, the workshop integrated prayer, dialogue, experiential learning, critical reflection, and collective discernment, with a consistent focus on translating values into concrete personal and institutional action.

Participants developed a deepened understanding of democracy as a lived, dialogical, and participatory practice rather than merely a procedural system. Through sustained engagement with constitutional values, citizenship, and contemporary democratic challenges, the workshop highlighted the importance of ethical responsibility, inclusivity, and attention to marginalized voices. A strong emphasis was also placed on eco-social responsibility, enabling participants to critically examine consumerism, environmental degradation, and the interconnectedness of democracy, sustainability, and care for creation.

The workshop fostered critical reflection on the role of higher education, underscoring how curricula, pedagogy, governance, and campus culture can actively shape democratic consciousness and responsible citizenship. A notable achievement was the creation of a genuinely dialogical faculty–student learning space, where mutual listening, shared inquiry, and co-learning strengthened everyday democratic practice within academic institutions.

The most significant and tangible outcome was the drafting of a Democratic Campus Charter, articulating collective commitments to participatory governance, inclusivity, ecological responsibility, ethical citizenship, dialogue-based conflict resolution, and active student engagement. Envisioned as a living framework, the charter aims to guide institutional policies and campus culture over time.

Supported by reflective and spiritual exercises, participants integrated these insights at a personal level, recognizing spirituality as a sustaining force for democratic and social engagement. The workshop concluded with a strong commitment to continuity, including follow-up initiatives to ensure accountability and implementation.

Overall, the workshop successfully moved participants from reflection to articulation and from dialogue to direction, resulting in both personal transformation and a concrete institutional outcome, while laying a strong foundation for embedding dialogical democracy, eco-social responsibility, and Jesuit values into everyday academic life.



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JHEASA Conference - Central Zone



The JHEASA Conference 3.0 (Central Zone) was held from 11–13 December 2025 at St. Xavier's School, Hazaribagh, focusing on the theme “Jesuit Identity and Our Mission.” The conference brought together Jesuit leaders and academicians to reflect on the contemporary challenges of higher education and to reaffirm the distinctive mission of Jesuit institutions.

Guided by the leadership and insights of senior Jesuit educators and resource persons, the conference strongly reaffirmed the centrality of Jesuit identity, Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAPs), and mission-oriented education. Participants emphasized moving beyond symbolic expressions of identity toward lived, contextual, and transformative engagement, particularly in service of marginalized and tribal communities.

A major outcome was the formal adoption of the JHEASA Reimagining and Restructuring (RR) Framework, a comprehensive, mission-focused institutional audit tool aimed at quality enhancement, sustainability, and renewal. The conference also resolved to strengthen inter-institutional collaboration and mentorship, with established colleges supporting developing institutions in accreditation, governance, and academic best practices.

Students' mental health and holistic well-being emerged as a key priority, leading to the decision to constitute a Zonal-level Task Force to address psychological, spiritual, and emotional needs through structured support systems. Institutions further committed themselves to future-ready academic initiatives, including responsible integration of digital technologies and Artificial Intelligence, rooted firmly in Jesuit ethics and human values.

The conference reaffirmed the preferential option for the poor, stressing expanded access, equity, and inclusion for first-generation learners, Adivasi and marginalized communities. Participants also resolved to enhance policy engagement and Jesuit thought leadership in national educational discourse, promoting democracy, pluralism, sustainability, and inclusive development.

Overall, JHEASA Conference 3.0 culminated in a shared, actionable roadmap that positions Jesuit Higher Education in the Central Zone as mission-centered, collaborative, inclusive, student-focused, and future-ready, committed to academic excellence, social justice, and holistic human formation.

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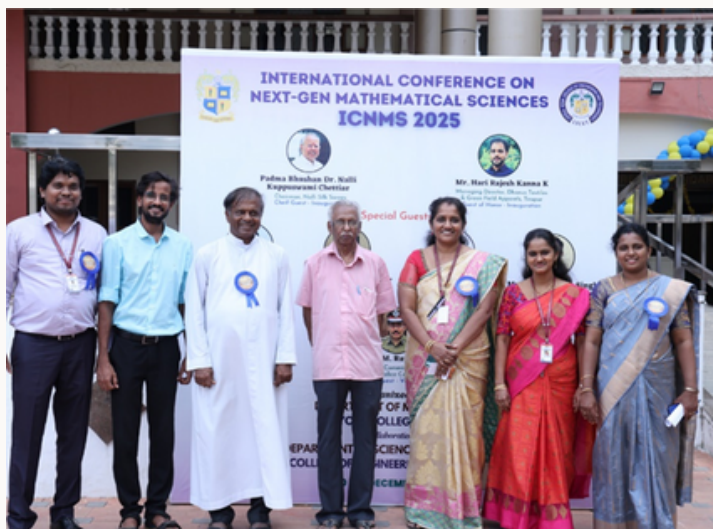

The event was organised by the college's Department of Mathematics in collaboration with the Department of Science and Humanities at Loyola-ICAM College of Engineering and Technology (LICET). Bringing together academicians, researchers, and industry professionals, the conference focused on recent advances in mathematical sciences and their interdisciplinary applications. The program featured an inaugural session, keynote addresses, and invited talks by eminent scholars, alongside the release of a book of chapters. Parallel technical sessions saw the presentation of over 150 research papers. The summit concluded with a valedictory session, cementing its role in promoting research collaboration, knowledge sharing, and academic excellence.
